

## CIVILISATIONS BY LAURENT BINET FICTION

#### Vintage £16.99

Laurent Binet has had great fun imagining how world events may have played out if some Viking warriors had simply turned their boats southward in 1000AD and preceded Columbus' discovery of the Americas by 492 years. An entertaining counterfactual story about the modern world.



## BROOD BY JACKIE POLZIN

#### Pan Macmillan £14.99

This novel follows a woman endeavouring to keep four chickens alive for a year in a middle-of-nowhere Minnesotan town. With sharply observed character sketches and the absurdity of raising chickens, Polzin's understated tale slowly unfolds to reveal an insightful meditation on care, motherhood and grief.



#### Gallic £8.99

The latest Japrisot to be re-issued by Gallic books is a cauldron of psychological tension. Two women are trapped in a house fire that might have been started deliberately. Only one of them survives...but which one?




## SISTERSONG BY LUCY HOLLAND FICTION

#### Swift Press £14.99






## HAMNET BY MAGGIE O'FARRELL FICTION






## HERE WE ARE By Graham Swift Fiction

## OF WOMEN AND SALT BY GABRIELA GARCIA FICTION


#### Pan Macmillan £14.99

#### Headline £16.99








## THE RATLINE BY PHILIPPE SANDS HISTORY




## SPEAK, OKINAWA BY ELIZABETH MIKI BRINA BIOGRAPHY




